Keres Children's Learning Center- Indigenous Montessori Institute



The Indigenous Montessori Institute is an anti-racist, anti-biased approach to education using Indigenous knowledge systems and the Montessori Philosophy to deliver teacher training. Its intention is to reclaim and center Indigenous Education by decolonizing education in the classroom and system levels, restore Indigenous knowledge systems that support early childhood education, and center Indigenous language, values, and beliefs in education. IMI aims to develop teachers who can serve the whole child by nurturing and honoring the language, values, and beliefs of the child's community along side rigorous academics.

School Programming Opportunities:

IMI offers two tracks of training 1.) Philosophy of Indigenous Education (PIE) and 2.) Montessori training. During the academic training year, tracks are interwoven to provide Montessori training through the lens of an Indigenous worldview. Learning and teaching methods for both tracks include: lectures on Montessori Philosophy and pedagogy, practice developing curriculum, etc..The PIE track delivers up to 10 training modules, one in each of the Keres Children's Learning Center's fundamental principles. IMI also offers technical assistance packages that are intended to assist organizations in strengthening their policies, understandings, and practices around anti-racism, Indigenous Education, Indigenous language immersion and dual-language Immersion, and tribal language programs and staff. Santa Fe School for the Arts & Sciences



The Arts and Science's CoLab Initiative provides New Mexico's early childhood community with a collaborative learning space, focused on social-emotional learning, teacher well-being and innovative educational practices; one that is community-led, equity-centered and driven by the collective wisdom of a diverse group. The CoLab grew out of the school's core principles of compassionate communication and community service; its collaborative, character-driven learning culture; and its use of intentional, reflective practices to nurture and challenge the whole learner. It comes at a time when critical educational training focused on social emotional supports and teacher wellness is needed to encourage teacher recruitment, attainment and retention; and ensure healthy outcomes for the children and families they serve.

Community Programming Opportunities:

Currently, the CoLab Initiative's program opportunities include: community-wide workshops focused on social emotional learning topics for teachers, in-house professional development designed in collaboration with our educational partners, and state-wide mentorship opportunities for pre-service and degree-seeking early childhood teachers in New Mexico.

New Mexico Friends of Foster Children



By funding common childhood activities, equipment, and experiences as well as educational supports and basic needs, New Mexico Friends of Foster Children is striving to improve the outcomes for children who are/have experienced foster care. Our programs support individual children and youth who are in state or tribal foster care, up through the age of 17, across the state.

School Support Opportunities:

We are interested in helping to meet the needs of individual students in foster care. Examples of items, activities, and experiences we could fund include school clothes/uniforms, shoes, field trip fees, school supplies (including calculators and assistive learning technology not covered by the school), activity/club/sports fees or equipment. We also offer a scholarship program to help with post-high school plans (college, trade school, training program).

CAVU (Climate Advocates Voces Unidas)



In CAVU's Climate Innovation Challenge (CIC), students from around the world create solutions that build climate resilience in their own communities and present their ideas in short videos. The Challenge culminates with a student showcase featuring inspirational speakers, screening student projects, and awarding cash prizes and scholarships for outstanding entries.

School Programming Opportunities:

CAVU's five-week, CIC curriculum prepares students to systematically identify vulnerabilities for a designated location or area of concern so that they can design a plan to help reduce the impact of a climate change threat. Students are asked to evaluate competing design solutions to determine how well they meet the criteria and constraints of a problem. After students go through this process, they create a 2-4 minute film or video presentation to showcase their proposed solutions. Students can then submit their short films or video presentations to our annual competition where cash prizes are awarded for outstanding student work.

At its core, the CIC is an undertaking in scientific storytelling. The program cultivates student leaders who can think innovatively and communicate effectively about adapting to our changing climate. Students are not only asked to follow a scientific process to design their projects, but they are challenged to use their creative minds to showcase these designs in exciting and engaging ways.

Once finished, participating students will have created a tool that showcases an original concept that they can easily share with peers, public and private sector businesses, community leaders, environmental stewards and more.

It is recommended that CIC registrants use the curriculum provided, but it is not required. Conversely, students and teachers who go through the curriculum are not required to enter the challenge. Students can register either independently or through an educator. CAVU staff can support teachers to implement the program so that it complements existing school and classroom lesson plans.

We encourage students to "think globally and adapt locally," fostering solutions-driven thinking for their own communities.

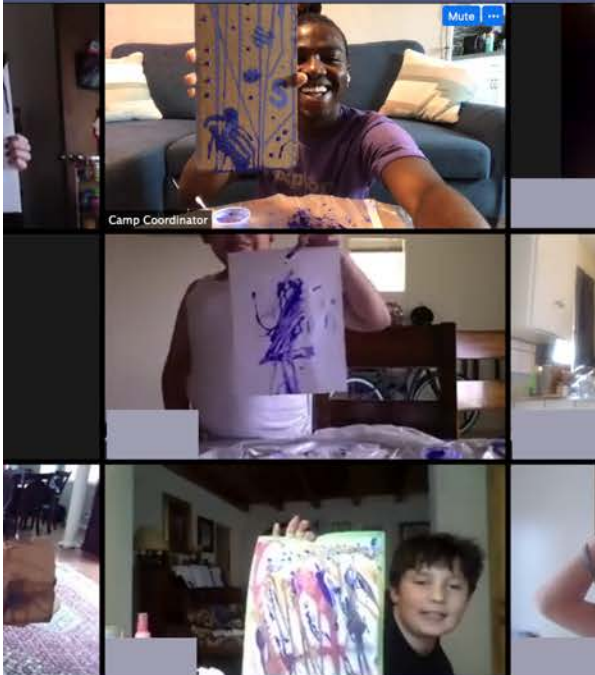

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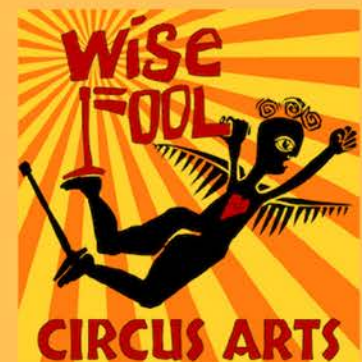

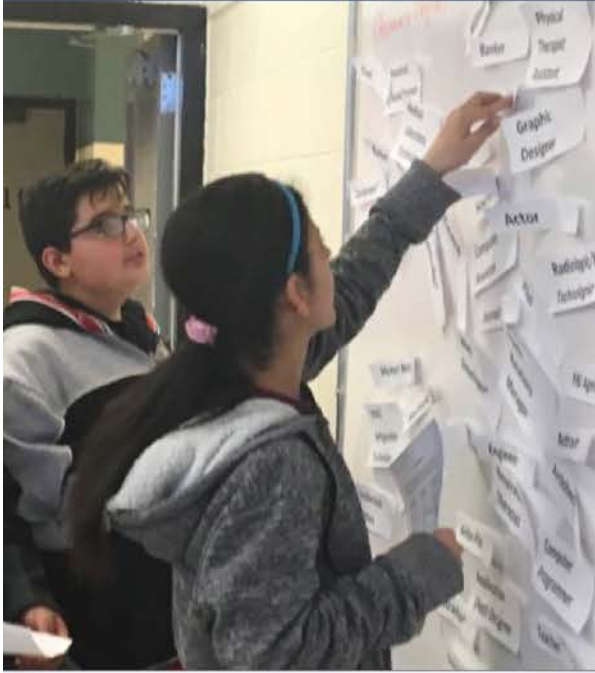

It is the mission of SOMOS to support and nurture the literary arts, written and spoken, by providing both place and resources for writers, readers, and learners while honoring the cultural diversity of Taos and the Southwest. Our programs include the Young Writers Program, Taos Writers Conference, SOMOS Writers Showcase; Poetry and Prose Months; Storytelling Festival, Taos Poet Laureateship, community-led literary events and a Bookshop that sells used books as well as new books by local authors. We offer scholarships to youth for all of our programs.

Our program develops well equipped and engaged youth; reducing isolation, anxiety, depression, and stress, while building self-esteem and communication skills, increasing empathy, improving social and language skills, and helping students realize their potential, which improves their confidence. Our child actors leave the program better prepared to face challenges later on in life, and to succeed in their schools, communities and families.

Community Programming Opportunities:

We offer classes for two months on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3:30-5:30pm in the spring and fall at our parent nonprofit organization, Teatro Paraguas. The spring and fall semesters are followed by a week of performances for schools and the public. We also offer a truncated summer camp each July, and our child actors often have opportunities to perform at community outreach events, and in outside productions with Teatro Paraguas.

School Programming Opportunities:

School-based grief support groups: Nuestra Jornada (Our Journey) is a peer support program addressing grief and loss for children and teenagers whose families have come to Santa Fe from Mexico and Central America. Designed and supported by an advisory committee of bilingual and bicultural youth service providers, Nuestra Jornada was created in 2014-2015 in response to increasing requests for Spanish-language peer grief support groups for grieving children and teenagers. Especially for those whose families have been victims of violent deaths connected to the human rights crises in Mexico, Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras. The program also supports grief due to other deaths, as well deportation, incarceration, parental abandonment, kidnapping and separation by borders. Nuestra Jornada unites youth in their common journeys: journeys of grief, journeys of immigration and journeys of healing.

We accomplish this mission by providing individual and group tutoring to children who are significantly below grade level in reading; by providing intensive two-week reading camps to groups of children during the summer; and by providing workshops, training, coaching, and mentoring to public school teachers, and tutors for other nonprofit and volunteer organizations, in order to improve their ability to teach reading.

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Las Cumbres Community Services



Las Cumbres Community Services provides services for children, prenatal to age 18, and their families in four Northern New Mexico counties, Santa Fe, Rio Arriba, Los Alamos and Taos as well as at the Borderland of TX/NM/MX. The agency mission is to provide quality services, public awareness, and integrated community supports for children, adults and families facing social, emotional and/or developmental challenges. We are working for a world where every person connects and thrives in their community.

School Programming Opportunities:

Las Cumbres' Santuario del Corazon (SDC) Program, providing case management and behavioral health services for immigrant and refugee families, offers educational supports for student learners in early Pre-K, elementary, middle, and high school and for adult learners of all ages. The team also actively interfaces with school administrators and social workers to be of assistance addressing the strengths and the challenges of this immigrant population seeking to become contributing members of their community. We are seeking to be more directly engaged in the future as well with the teachers who work with these children and their families.

While settling into their new Northern New Mexico community, the adjustment period is challenging for children. They must be given time, special supports, and practice to meet educational standards while they acculturate. The SDC Program identifies equity gaps in the educational system for many of our clients, and responded by developing specialized school-based services. With these supports in place, many of these children will begin to excel and become the first in their families to further their education. Beyond performance support in school, the SDC Program provides immigrant students with ongoing resettlement assistance to integrate into their new communities and establish a safe social environment in school and at home, while preserving their culture. Many also benefit from simultaneous mental health treatment to treat traumatic stress symptoms, which is key to their ability to feel safe, regulate, and learn.

Currently SDC is in an exciting pilot phase with Taos and Santa Fe Public Schools to identify the components of group and individual services that are most beneficial. The Program will explore education-based questions related to building equitable language supports, promoting multiculturalism, honoring family values, and cultural adaptations to our evidence-based mental health services. Assistance is also available through SDC Family Navigators in Rio Arriba County.

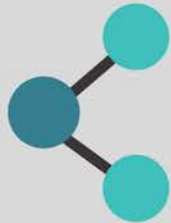

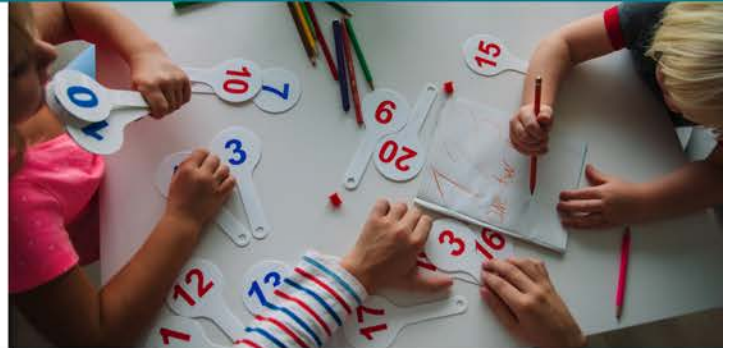

SFCTSL provides customized trainings/workshops, facilitation and coaching to educators in Northern New Mexico. Our interactive workshops and coaching focus on three broad areas of transformative leadership work: building collective aspiration; nurturing a collaborative, creative, growth-oriented culture; and approaching leadership as learning work. We work closely with school leadership groups to help them create the type of school they want to see for the children and families they serve.

School Programming Opportunities:

We offer a menu of trainings that aim to help schools (pre k - 12) create a culture of deeper learning. We focus on subjects such as inquiry-based and project-based learning, developing a positive school culture, Reggio Emilia-inspired early childhood learning, structuring PLCs to move teacher practice forward, creating a school-wide compelling purpose, cultivating shared leadership, implementing peer coaching, embedding growth mindset, nurturing an ethic of excellence and more.
